Nationals week started with the U.S. PreTrials, a popular program that helps athletes develop proper body and baton technique, gives them the opportunity to express their personalities in freestyle and pairs programs, and helps prepare athletes, coaches and judges for the rigors of the U.S. Trials and international competition. The U.S. Trials Medal Round featured the Youth, Junior and Senior Men and Women selected at the U.S. Trials in March competing for final placement. 2022 Choreographer of the Year

COLLEEN MURPHY MIDDLETON

Forte Twirl and Dance Team coach Colleen Murphy Middleton received the 2022 Choreographer of the Year Award for her choreography of the Forte artistic group. The Atlanta, Georgia-based group did a high-energy, aerobics-style program that qualified for the 2023 IBTF World Championship and Nations Cup, which will be held in Liverpool, England.

The national group judges selected the winning choreography and the award was presented by Judges Department Director Kathy Butera Fanney.

"They had a lot of energy and audience appeal,"
Butera Fanney said. "Costuming clearly indicated their
theme and it was definitely entertaining."

"I knew that this was an award that judges looked for, but you never really think about it during the year while you're working with your team members and making them the best they can be," Middleton said.

She accepted her award with the support of her Forte Twirl and Dance team family and her coach from the team she grew up with.

Middleton said she and her staff always try to pick a theme that tells a message. Leg warmers, sweatbands, bright blush and all, this year's 80s-inspired workout routine was about more than physical exercise.

"Our underlying message was body positivity because we think it's something that really resonates with the age group that we are working with – teenagers and college aged girls – but in a fun way," she said.

The music selections enhanced the message of the artistic group. The music started with physical activity, transitioned to self-confidence and ended with Lady Gaga's "Born This Way".

"It's about who you are as a person," Middleton added. "You can't change everything about your body, you are who you are."


